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#### **CURRENCY NOTES DEFACED BY RBI GOVERNOR'S AUTOGRAPHS?**

Many notes are on display on social networks as pride collectibles of reputed numismatists.





Though the clean note policy of Reserve Bank of India and Banking Regulation Act clearly restrict any writing or inscription on (the watermark window or) any part of currency notes, people still write on notes due to unawareness. Under the clean note policy, RBI has clearly mentioned that writing and/or scribbling on currency notes and distribution of such defaced notes is punishable and can carry penalty as well. But time and again, we regularly come across instances when people violate this rule. In the past, newspapers and publications have consistently highlighted this issue and even shared stories how this practice negatively affects Indian economy and as a result thousands of crores of rupees are wasted every year.

Interestingly if few reputed numismatists are to be believed, ICCG News has recently come across many notes of various denominations which have been defaced through signing autographs by RBI Governors themselves. Such notes have been displayed by few senior numismatists on their social network walls. Though the authenticity of the autographs are subject to investigation but keeping in view the reputation of the numismatists, its most unlikely for the autographed signatures to be or forged. In fact one of the currency notes is even stamped (on the water mark) by the official Governor of the RBI along with his autograph.

ICCG News was flooded with mixed reactions from people who were quite disappointed and shocked, asking various questions after these notes were displayed on 'Face book', a social network site. "If reputed numismatists display such defaced notes as proud collectibles then I really doubt the future of Indian numismatics" expressed Mr. Tanay R. Republic India has minted many coins to commemorate Mahatama Gandhi in various denominations. Earlier this year the reserve bank launched Rs 10 coins to commemorate the centenary of return of Mahatama Gandhi to India from South Africa.

Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi was the overwhelming political and ideological pioneer of India amid the Indian autonomy development. He spearheaded satyagraha, characterized as imperviousness to oppression through mass common defiance, a reasoning solidly established upon ahimsa, or aggregate peacefulness. This idea helped India to pick up autonomy, and motivated developments for social equality and flexibility over the world. He is regularly alluded to as Mahatama Gandhi or 'Extraordinary Soul.'

Commemorating Mahatama Gandhi's 146th birth anniversary, the BCCI also recently launched a specially-minted toss coin with the images of the Mahatama Gandhi and Nelson Mandela for the India-South Africa cricket series which started on Gandhiji's birthday 02nd October, 2015.

"The toss coin in gold features an impression of Mahatama Gandhi and Nelson Mandela as 'Heads' and the Freedom Series as 'Tails'," the BCCI said in a statement. **Cont... 8<sup>th</sup> Page**




The new Re.1 note was launched by the Finance Ministry on March 6, 2014. The launch took place at the Shrinathji temple in Nathdwara, Rajasthan. It bears the signature of the Finance Secretary Rajiv Mehrishi and not the RBI Governor. Only Re. 1 notes and coins in India are signed by the Finance Secretary as they



are printed by the Central Government. Here too the new one rupee note was seen defaced by an autographed signature by Finance Secretary Rajiv Mehrishi which is known to be endowed at the Shrinathji temple during the launching of the note.

Even after RBI started issuing the notes a couple of months ago, many a dealers were known to have blocked these notes and as a result these notes have not yet been seen in circulation ICCG News hopes that the though many a collectors have added them in their collections.


#### **INTERVIEW**

#### A brief part of Indian history preserved in currency notes

His passion for collecting old currency notes has been for years and his collection is something that speaks a lot about history of Portuguese India, French India and Hyderabadi Nizam.

Mr Satpal Sahni from Mumbai shared his pride collectibles and thoughts with ICCG News recently. Excerpts from the interview:

"From childhood I have been staying in Mumbai and I should be passionate of my hobby since 20 years now." Says Mr Sahni.



My collection is all about old currency notes with focus on Notes of Portuguese India, French Pondicherry and Hyderabad under Nizam.

What inspired you for this?

My interest started after my father handed over his box of foreign coins. It was actually my father's coin collection that created my interest in numismatics. I am thankful to my father Shri Rajinder Sahni for developing my interest into this and whole heartedly supporting me. I then went to Flora Fountain (famous place in Mumbai where many coin sellers have stalls) to buy some more coins and my interest and enthusiasm increased. I remember buying my

first coin from one dealer from fountain. That was my first memory. Though I can't recall the exact year, but it should be at least 20 years back.

• So it were the coins that you started collecting. And how did your interest shift to currency notes?

Yes, slowly my interest shifted towards currency notes as I found them more rare and difficult to buy.

From where do you find such rare notes?

I used to visit (Coin) exhibitions in Mumbai where we can find such notes but even there at times I used to have difficulty in finding the right condition note at a reasonable price. It's a demand supply equation, with supplies dwindling day by day.

And what is your favorite currency note?

Each note is dear and valuable to me as I relish a part of my country's history with me.



- So today do you see yourself satisfied with your currency notes collection or you still see space for addition? Collection can never be over. There is always more and more to add. For example, even if a collector has finished collecting denomination then he can start collecting by different governor signatures.
- Do your children know about your collection and how do they see your passion?


Well my children very well know, that my collection is my passion and a part of my identity. They also do know of my knowledge in notes and I hope that in future they too would gain interest in this hobby.

• Like your children there would be many more young collectors who would love to be a part of this hobby of collecting coins, notes, stamps or else. What words would you like to share with them?

All I would want them to know is that reading and learning about history is one thing but actually owning a part of history (like coin, note or else) is something far better. All numismatic coins and notes are links and proof of our country's history. Every collection should start with true interest. And if possible a collector

> should also have knowledge about future scarcity and price appreciation of what he is collecting.

I believe ICCG is doing an invaluable service to our numismatic collectors and also its efforts bring out more interest and knowledge to old and new collectors.


#### Government discontinues stamps of Indira Gandhi and Rajiv Gandhi

Stamps of Homi J Bhabha, JRD Tata, C V Raman, Satyajit Ray have also been discontinued under the new theme.









**NEW DELHI:** Government has decided to discontinue stamps of former Prime Ministers, Rajiv and Indira Gandhi, under the new definitive theme of postal stamps.

The NDA government has replaced 'Builders of Modern India' theme (which included stamps of Indira and Rajiv Gandhi), with 'Makers of India' theme.

The new definitive theme would bring in host of eminent personalities like Shyama Prasad Mukherjee, Deen Dayal Upadhyay, Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, Shivaji, Maulana Azad, Bhagat Singh, Jayaprakash Narayan, Ram Manohar Lohia, Vivekananda and Maharana Pratap.

Earlier, commemorative stamps, which are limited in numbers, of most of these personalities were issued and some were also made available for regular use.

As per the reports gathered by ICCG News, It is a routine process. Addition and subtraction of stamps is done based on the theme.

However, stamps of Jawaharlal Nehru, Mahatma Gandhi, B R Ambedkar and Mother Teresa have been retained.

"The stamps of the new theme are under print and expected to be available across post offices within a month. The stock of old theme is still available and will be there under it gets exhausted," a government official said.

Stamps of Bal Gangadhar Tilak, Rajendra Prasad, Srinivasa Ramanujan, Rabindranath Tagore, Subramania Bharati, Bhimsen Joshi, M S Subbulakshmi and Bismillah Khan will also be made available for regular use.



Rare collections at philatelic show Kannur



## Rare postal stamps on display to commemorate Mahatma Gandhi's birth anniversary at Chandigarh.

A 10 day exhibition was organized at Punjab University

An exhibition of rare postal stamps issued by the Government of India was organized at Punjab University (PU) from 23rd September till 02nd October 2015. The exhibition was organized by the Department of



Gandhian and Peace Studies, in collaboration with Department of India Postal Services (HQ), Punjab Circle, Chandigarh. The exhibition was inaugurated by Director Postal Services, (HQ) Punjab Circle, Chandigarh, Manisha Bansal Badal, who emphasized on the importance of postal stamps in the Internet age. At the exhibition, postal stamps related to freedom fighters such as Mahatma Gandhi, Subhash Chandra Bose, Sardar Patel, Sarojini Naidu and others had been displayed. The exhibition continued till October 2, in commemoration of Mahatma Gandhi's birth anniversary.

The postal department had also set up a counter where visitors could have their pictures in the form of postal stamps recognized by the department. On the first day of the exhibition, Pandit Onkar Chand delivered a lecture on 'Contribution of Lala Lajpat Rai in Indian Freedom Struggle', in which he emphasized that in the age of information and Internet, transparent accountability, truth and ethics, as practiced by Lala Lajpat Rai, had acquired an added significance to counter corruption, crimes and terrorism. He also stressed ideal nationalist policies to help India stand economically. In the end, he answered questions raised by the faculty members, research scholars and students.

#### 400-year-old Buddha coin unearthed in Chamarajanagar

MYSURU: An archaeology researcher from Vijayapura unearthed the coin belonging to the East India Company from an agriculture field near Tibetan Colony, 40km from Kollegal. Dr B Basavaraju Tagarapura, regional director, Vijayapura, Karnataka State Open University said that he found the coin while doing research at the site. "The silver coin has an image of Gautama Buddha sitting on a lotus and has the words half anna, 1616 and East India Company embossed," said Dr. Tagarapura.

The discovery of a 400-year-old silver coin embossed with an image of Gautama Buddha from Vadayara Palya village in Kollegala taluk, Chamarajanagar district, points to the spread of Buddhism in the region.

Dr. Basavaraju added, "In the 3rd century, Emperor Ashoka sent monk Mahadeva to Mahisha Mandala (Mysuru) and Rakshitha to Banavasi (Uttara Kannada districts). Ashoka's inscriptions were found in various places in Chitradurga, Raichur, and Kalaburagi districts. Recently Buddha inscriptions were found in Rajagatta village in Doddaballapur taluk. But the coin found in Kollegal taluk has indicated the influence of Buddhism in the Mysuru region," he said.

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#### FAQ

#### 1. What are error coins? Kevin kandula (Bangalore)

Ans: Simply put, an error coin is a mint-made mistake — in the process of creating the coin at the mint, There are many types of error coins, and the exciting thing about error coins is that they can often be be found in circulation.

#### 2. What is mintmark on a coin? Kalpana Roy (Delhi)

Ans: A mint mark is a letter, symbol or an inscription on a coin indicating the mint where the coin was produced.

#### 3. What is coin toning? How does it affect coins and the value? Somnath Choudhary (West Bengal)

Ans: Coin toning can intrinsically increase or decrease the value of coins. Natural coin toning can be quite beautiful. It can also be outrageously ugly. And because beauty is often times in the eye of the beholder, placing a value on a coin due to its toning can present problems. Beware of artificially toned coins.

#### 4. What is a must have tool for numismatist? Nikita Gomes (Goa)

Ans: Eye glass/magnifier, pocket weighing scale & caliper meter scale

#### 5. What does "OMS" coin mean? Sanjay Singh (Jarkhand)

Ans: Off metal strike, this type of error happens when the coin is minted on a metal that it is not intended for.

One is the metal alloy that is being used to strike the coins comes in different alloy mix percentage than specified. For example the Ferritic stainless steel [FSS] used for the current coins is a combination of Iron 82% and Chromium 18%. If the metal delivered to mint comes in say more Iron content, say 90%, then the coin will be more Iron and will have different characteristics than the FSS.

The second way this can occur is if there are 2 coins being minted with similar metal [not distinguishable easily to normal eye] and there is a mix up in the feeding the metal alloy sheet to the blanking machine. For example from 1964 to 1971 the 50 Paise was minted using Pure Nickel, the 10 paise from 1964 to 1967 was minted in Cupro Nickel and from 1968 to 1971 it was Nickel Brass. All the metals look same in raw form and develop distinctive toning after finishing. Hence if Cupro Nickel sheet was used to mint the 50 Paise it would have been OMS. Note that for the coins specified there was a slight difference in thickness of the coins [which means that the OMS coins would have been of different thickness as well]. There are very few known and accepted OMS error coins in Republic India coinage.



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#### **Numismatists and Philatelists exhibits** unique collectibles in Ernakulam, Kochi

Kerala Numismatic Society organized a three day All India Coin Exhibition at Town Hall, Ernakulam, Kochi from 18th to 20th September 2015.

The State Public Works Department (PWD) Minister V K Ibrahim Kunju inaugurated the



exhibition which proved no less than a golden opportunity for collectors and students who are history enthusiastic, as coins practiced in 332 BC during the period of Alexander the Great, Coins of ancient Gupta and Mughal Emperors of India and coins of local chieftains in India were exhibited in the exhibition. #### Business of exchanging worn out banknotes thriving in Mumbai Demand of new crisp notes has also seen a rise



"Yahan Fate-Purane note badle jaate hain". Almost everyone in India might have seen such street money exchangers and many would have even exchanged their notes with them. ICCG News though exchanged few words from such a 'notewalla' from Mumbai:

Raamji bhai is not like most of the street vendors in Mumbai Central, Mumbai. The hand-painted sign on his wooden counter, "Yahan Fate-Purane note badle jaate hain" reveals a different story. He sells money. For the last 30 years, Raamji bhai has offered customers new banknotes for soiled or damaged ones for a fee that earns him about 100,000 rupees a year. It has also helped him for the marriages of his two children. Getting fresh banknotes or using soiled ones can be difficult in India. Shopkeepers and other merchants

routinely refuse to accept soiled notes, while people require loose change and fresh notes for regular use.

Its not as if there are no formal channels available for the exchange of soiled and mutilated notes. The Reserve Bank of India has provided clear guidelines for it. If a note is old or damaged, you can take it to your bank, have it assessed based on the RBI guidelines, and then changed. But seldom does anyone take the hassle of going to the bank and dealing with the bureaucratic procedure. And really, hardly anyone has the expertise to assess whether the note meets the RBI guidelines. So these people like Raamji bhai works as the instant alternative. It's queue-less, painless and quite quick. And so, for this kind of service, people are willing to pay a fair bit of commission happily.

"We charge commission depending on the condition of the note," the 62-year-old Raamji bhai said to ICCG News while examining some 50 & 100 rupees notes nibbled by rats. "Around 40-50 people come to us daily."

Such business operates in grey zone. People like Raamji bhai have no permits or licenses to do what they are doing. But they do meet a specific need, especially among less educated and less privileged people who are outside the formal banking system.


This business of notes is livelihood for hundreds in Mumbai, with vendors offering convenience to customers by charging a fee of up to 20 percent to replace damaged banknotes. A mildly damaged 500 rupee note, for instance, can be exchanged for 480 rupees, while a bundle of crisp, new 10 rupee notes valued at 1,000 rupees is priced at 1,050 rupees.

Such roadside vendors work jointly with agents who collect old notes and submit them at the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) office to claim their exchange value according to rules. The same agents also source new notes and distribute them to vendors for a piece of the profit. The business, however, goes beyond these roadside counters.

This perpetuates the money changing market, which adjusts its rates depending on the season. Agents outside the RBI office said a bundle of 10 rupee banknotes (valued at 1,000 rupees) could cost as much as 1,100 rupees when demand jumps during the festive and wedding season. The same bundle would be priced at 1,200 rupees during shradh, an inauspicious period to make purchases in India, agents said. In the wedding season, people use newly minted banknotes for gifts, making garlands for the groom and showering money while dancing in marriage processions. The RBI in September appealed to the public to avoid using notes for such purposes as it shortens their life span. But as Raamji bhai in Mumbai Central gears up for a busy wedding season, he said he never wanted his educated son, who works in a school,

"What's the point of educating him then," Raamji bhai said. "I would always like my son to get a decent job," he added.



Each denomination is profusely illustrated with mint identifiers; obverse & reverse types, and is followed by the Catalogue listing with details like year, metal, initials, mint, mint marks, diameter, obverse & reverse varieties, mintage and remarks. The book catalogues as many as 1,458 coins with about 1,000 illustrations: as described by Rajgor's.

As per the report published in the Gujarati daily 'Divya Bhaskar' on 12th of September, a one rupee coin of 1973 could fetch more than three lakh rupees. Further a one rupee coin of 'Indira Gandhi' could be sold for two lakh rupees. As per the report the news paper had interviewed one money dealer from Andra Pradesh named B Chandrasekhar (who actually seems to be selling fake coins as often seen with many a road side coin sellers). The newspaper claims the dealer to have sold many such coins at such high rates. Only if the reporter would have tried to search the fact before publishing such wrong and rather funny article, he would have learnt that the RBI never issued such coins.

RBI never issued any 1 rupee coin between 1970 and 1975. Only proof sets of 1971, 1972, 1973 & 1974 were issued by the Bombay mint, with 'B' mark seen below the year mentioned. Even the proof set of 1973 is not valued more than 13,000 rupees. Still the newspaper clearly posted the pictures of 1972 and 1973 year coins of one rupee with 'Star' mint mark on their cover story. Both coin images are clear FAKES.

As for the 'Indira Gandhi' coin of 1 rupee (that was sold for two lakhs): RBI never issued any one rupee coin of Indira Gandhi ever. Indira Gandhi coin was issued on in 50 paise and 5 rupees denominations. The above stated coin again is a fake which is easily available with road side money dealers for 100 rupees approx.

In an eager attempt to make a story interesting, few journalists often come up with such an irresponsible and fake article which begets a very negative image of an entire community.

#### Error coins do command big money:



If you have questions regarding 'error coins', you are not alone. Coins resulted due to technical mistakes may make the coin lose its eye appeal and thus decrease such coin's value. Such coins are often seen as a bad news and the person with such a coin always tries finding a quick way of getting rid of it. Once struck with such a coin, one would try to palm it off to some unsuspecting victim, or push it into a donation box of some religious place (don't be surprised – many do so) or absorb the loss. However, these minting imperfections actually increases the price of a coin and results in making it a rare collectible. These are coin errors. Minting defects are very rare especially with the technology of modern coinage. Coins with flaws too, are not supposed to be issued for circulation and are instead recycled.

Because of this, error coins are very valuable to coin collectors. In fact, coin error collectables are generally more expensive than other collectible coins without the mint mistakes. Such coins may be priced from hundreds to thousands of rupees depending on the rarity of the technical error. Recently one multiple strike error coin was auctioned for more than 3 thousand rupees in Mumbai.

There are also numismatic organizations that focus on error coin collecting.
