## **Government Pays Two Times for Duplicate** Sikh Coins Though Originals Available at Half Price

hen the collection of original Sikh coins is available at half the price in the open market, the Punjab Government has paid lakhs of rupees to a private firm just for minting duplicate coins. These coins will be placed at the upcoming Sikh Coins Museum at Gobindgarh Fort. For building interiors of the museum, the then SAD-BJP government had given a contract for Rs 5.5 crore to a Delhi-based firm. The contract also included Rs. 20 lakh for supplying duplicates of around 400 coins related to the Sikh history.

The decision has raised eyebrows. According to numismatics, most of the original Sikh coins in copper are available anywhere between Rs. 150 and Rs. 200 and silver coins between Rs. 1,500 and Rs. 2,500.

n the world of coin collecting, we are believed to stay away from the 'Fake' & 'Counterfeit' coins. Begetting any of these unknowingly leaves us in a state of dismay. Novelty coins, replica coins, copy coins... No matter what term we may use, those are fake coins! Coins that aren't 100 percent mint made has grown up into a huge collection for Mr. Rahul G. Keshwani. Excerpts from the interview....

### How did you get attracted to 'Fake coins' and how long have you been collecting?


As a serious coin collector I always get attracted to coins which may prove out to be a good source of study. And 'fake coins' are the negative part of the hobby which I collect for two major reasons: Study purpose and for spreading awareness as much as I can. It's an area of interest that largely grew out from coin collection and I started to add fake coins so I could study them and become more knowledgeable about how to detect others.

### When did you start collecting these coins?

In general, I started collecting coins since year 1995 at the age of ten, but collection of 'Fake coins' started in 2002 when I came across fake coins from circulation which was a five rupee cupro-nickel coin of 1994 with a Mumbai mint mark. In some cases, there are varieties of coins that once were considered to be authentic only to be later discovered as altered or fake.

It was just like adding one more dish to the entire meal. One day I was just sitting with my coins at that time I observed that I had many fake coins which I had got from circulation, collectors, dealers and friends. That day I started organizing my collection of fake coins & gave equal importance to these coins like others.



### Please let us know a bit more of your collection.

As a numismatist, I love to study and collect all types of coins, but when it comes to 'fake' or 'counterfeit' coins, my urge to study gets to a higher level. Usually people try to get rid of such coins at the earliest but I add at least one variety of every different type and study the difference between the fake and the original. Slowly I observed that a single 'fake' coin may not be of any value but a theme wise collection of such coins is also appreciated equally like any other collection.

Theme wise collection of 'Fake Coins'..!! Could we even think about organizing a collection of 'fake coins'?



Mr. Rahul continues.. I have organized my collection of fake coins in different categories: Indian Princely State, British India (Silver, Cu-ni and other metals), Republic India (Definitive, Commemorative, Proof & UNC), Error in fake coins & Fake coins of foreign countries.

### Do we find fake coin in various denominations?

Yes, I have fake coins in almost every denomination like ¼ anna, ½ anna, 1, 2, 4 & 8 annas, ¼ rupee, ½ rupee and 1 rupee. I also have a fake coin of 2/8 anna. I British India, I have fakes of King William, Victoria Queen with continuous and divided legend, Victoria Queen with crown, Victoria Empress, Edward, George V, & George VI. In republic India, I have a fake coin in all denominations from one paise to 10 rupees.

### And what are 'altered coins'? What is the difference between fake and altered coins? And how do you study such coins?

Fake coins are the coins that are minted outside the mint. These are clear counterfeit and duplicate coins. But altered coins (or tooled coins) are the original genuine mint produce coins which are altered to increase their value. These coins also serve as a good study material. Like in republic India, I have coins which were NOT minted in particular years, like 1 rupee coins of 1971, 1972, 1973 & 1974. These coins were issued only with proof and UNC sets, but I have coins where the date has been altered on the original coin. Many coins of 1976, 1978 & 1979 have been altered in which their date has been changed to appear 1970.

As for fake coins in republic India, I have many fake coins in commemorative issues like 20 paise Food for all, Gandhi, 1 rupee Fisheries, Indira Gandhi, Chharapati Shivaji, Subhas Chandra Bose Birth Centenary, 2 rupees Dr. B R Ambedkar Birth Centenary, Indira Gandhi etc.. 5 rupees Indira Gandhi, ILO World of Work, 200 Years of SBI and also 10 rupees coin with extra rays and altered mint mark etc....

### And if that's not all, we believe you have a decent collection of fakes from East India Company period as well. Isn't it?

Yes, smiles Mr.Rahul..... as he continues.. I have more than 100 coins with the images of God, religious objects, zodiac signs etc with year like 1717, 1818, 1919 etc with East India Company written on its other face. I also have 'fake coins' of countries like USA, Great Britain, China etc...

### Was it tough collecting fake coins as they are often available for more price then the originals?

Randomly you may get many fake and altered coins from here and there but it is very difficult to find a particular coin if you are collecting theme wise or year wise. Here it may be easy to get original coin but it may get very difficult to find a fake coin. Many dealers and some road side sellers try to sell you fake coins at very high price by telling fake stories about it and related to it. Many online websites are also selling fake coins by saying that they are genuine. Just because of my knowledge and by the grace of God I have never been fooled or cheated by any seller while buying an original coin. I have never spent big amount to buy a fake coin and I would never suggest anyone to do so either. In fact many of my friends know about my fake coin collection and I have also received fake coins as gift from collectors and dealers like Mr. Jigar Desai, Mr. Ramesh Velunde, Mr. Siddharth Shah, Mr. Rasheed Shaikh, Mr. Rohan Shah, Mr. Apurba Chatterjee and many more..

Experts say that barring a few rare coins, even if government purchases the entire collection of Sikh coins from the open market it won't cost more than Rs 10 lakh. The Gobindgarh Fort museum will display coins from 1765 onwards, when Sikh "misls" started issuing their own coins.

Besides, a large collection of original Sikh coins is gathering dust in state museums. The number is so high that the department is finding it difficult to find place to display these. One of the largest collections of Sikh coins is at Patiala's Sheesh Mahal.

The government decision not only indicates towards inappropriate expenditure, but is also against the spirit of museology.



A Chandigarh-based eminent numismatist, who has written several books on numismatics, said in the discipline of studies of museums it also amounts to misguiding people. "I have seen the museums across the world but nowhere have I come across a museum showcasing duplicate items. Can you really call the place museum if it doesn't showcase original artefacts," he said.

Rameshwar Dutt, an archaeologist and president of the Global Numismatics and Philately Society, said it was a known fact that often collectors and numismatists or their families are keen to donate or give their collections to government museums on loans for just acknowledgement of their contribution. "It seems that the government has been taken for a ride by unscrupulous elements," he said. Another concern raised by numismatists is that it is a case in which government itself is promoting minting of duplicate coins. "Once the suppliers are ready with dies, they will create havoc in the market by supplying fake Sikh coins," said Dutt.

After her fight and PIL the government set up a water purification plant and spend more than Rs Five crore in Ramdurg for supplying potable water.

## Rare coins, notes on display at 9th National Numismatic Exhibition

engaluru: A rare silver double rupee called Haidari from Tipu Sultan's period had been attracting much attention at the 9th National Numismatic Exhibition that the organizers had been forced to take it off display for security reasons. This and other such rare coins and notes could be seen attracting a large number of collectors to the exhibition-cum-auction organized by citybased Marudhar Arts, from February 23rd to 25th 2018.

With more numbers of dealers participating this year, collectors are spoilt for choice. 105 exhibitors this year took part from all over the country. On 23rd February which was the first day, approximately 1,500 people visited and the numbers only grew during weekend.

For the first time ever, two coins issued by Mughal rulers Nur Jahan and Raziya Sultan were up for auction. The silver rupee coin from the Lahore Mint was issued by Nur Jahan and its base price was Rs. 3.5 lakh. The coin issued by Raziya Sultan was issued in the name of her father, Iltutmish, in the 13th Century.

The exhibition also saw the largest bank note issued by Malaysia this year, priced at Rs. 90,000. Sibi Mullanikadu



from Travancore Coins is one of the few people who has the note in India. "Around 6,000 notes were issued by Malaysia and could

The expo also has a wide variety of antique items such as brass oil pots, old cycle lamps, craved knives, and rare books. R. Raghavendra from Bengaluru has a collection of over 100 rare books, apart from a huge collection of coins and notes. He had put on display the first edition of The Indian War of Independence of 1857 written by Veer Savarkar in 1909. "There are only three copies of the book in the world, which was banned by the British," said Mr. Raghavendra. S. Bose, a numismatist, said he was happy with the variety offered at the exhibition.

In order to promote the hobby among younger generations, Marudhar Arts will soon conduct a year-long programme to create awareness about numismatics. "We are planning to conduct free seminars and workshops for those who want to take it up as a hobby. The programme will start in May," said Mr. Archie Maru, Director, Marudhar Arts.

What can a collector do to stay away from 'fake / altered coins'? I would always advise new collectors to read numismatic books on related subjects, go through article available on various educational websites related to coins, attend workshops, lectures & seminars by experts and scholars. Avoid









buying coins without having thorough knowledge on the same. As for me, I have made it a habit and now a regular practice that whenever I buy a rare or an expensive coin, I discuss with a couple of experts to get proper guidance and market value of that

How would you like to make use of your study and your collection to benefit other budding collectors? By exhibiting my collection, I would always like to spread awareness among young coin collectors in clearing the vital points and difference between the fakes, altered and the original coins. I have earlier displayed an awareness display at the inaugural numismatic EXPO by ICCG at the World Trade Center early last year which begot a fair amount of appreciation. And I hope to continue in the same manner as a step to serve Indian numismatics in a positive way.


The group held their maiden exhibition in Mumbai on 17th February 2018 in Mumbai. The themes displayed in this exhibition were as following,


- Hyperinflation banknotes (Banknotes with denomination above 50,000)

angaluru: The presence of women is felt in various facets of our lives. A rare exhibition of stamps, first-day covers and pictorial cancellations featuring women, organized by Dakshina Kannada Philatelic and Numismatic Association (DKPANA), at the Head Post Office in Pandeshwar, on March 11th 2018 was a tribute to the women of India.

Philatelist Jane D'Souza of Mangaluru was the exhibitor of the day. Stamps, first-day covers, miniature sheets and pictorial cancellations on Indian women achievers were part of the expo.

Lakshmi, a visitor and a stamp collector herself said she was fascinated to see some of the very old and rare stamps on prominent Indian women.

Eminent Bollywood actor and social activist Rahul Bose delivered the





## Special Cover & Memorial in Memory of Upendra Pai

anipal: District-in-Charge minister Shri. Pramod Madhwaraj said that Upendra Pai's contribution to the landmark growth of Manipal is immense. Speaking after unveiling Upendra Pai's memorial, at Udupi, near the DC Office junction on 25th February 2018, the minister said that owing to the sacrifice, dedication and hard work of the great visionary, the barren land of Manipal has been transformed into a beautiful hub. The CMC offered the land to construct the memorial, and the sculpture consists of a description that is found nowhere, he said.

The monument is the brainchild of contemporary artist Tallur L N, who is from Kundapur. The sculpture represents the life of the late Upendra Pai, along with the



tradition, culture and technology of the region. There are seven rings in the shape of coins of historical and present days. The monument weighs 6.5 ton and is 27 feet tall.

The seven coins on the monument are the replica of the pre-independence era's one paisa coin with images of the sun and the moon; a replica of an antique coin and the image of the tiger in RBI logo; a 3 paisa coin with images of fisheries and a bull with agricultural equipment; profiles of Chanakya and Mahatma Gandhi, including the year the latter visited Udupi; one side of a coin carries a five paisa coin and the Mangaluru tile, and the other side carries the royal emblem of Alupa Dynasty and Kannada script from the Vijayanagara dynasty, and lastly a present day one rupee coin.

A special postal cover in memory of the late Upendra Pai was also released by the minister on the occasion.

## Glimpse from the Past at Vellore

**Three-Day Expo of Rarest Coins, Stamps and Currencies** 

ellore: When numismatist C. Tamilvanan displayed a silver coin minted during the Vijayanagara empire, its size baffled onlookers. The size of a rice grain, the coin that weighs 0.19 grams and dates back to the 13th century is proof that nanotechnology had its early beginnings in India, he says.

Twelve such small-sized coins of different weights of the Vijayanagara period are among his prized possession. He displayed eight of them at a three-day exhibition of the most expensive and rarest coins, stamps and currencies of India and the world that was inaugurated at Town Hall on 16th February 2018.

"On this tiny coin of denomination 'tara', the Telugu script for "Bu" denoting emperor Bukka Raya has been inscribed. This is what we call 'nano coins'. Only recently did numismatists start to take notice of these small coins. We have started to document these coins and are studying the purpose for which they could have been used," he said.

Another silver coin of Vijayanagara empire, weighing 0.21 grams, had also been displayed. Mr. Tamilvanan, who is the secretary of Numismatic and Philatelic Association of Vellore Fort, had also put on display his collection of coins minted by the Arcot Nawabs. "I have displayed 160 coins minted by the Arcot Nawabs in all the areas occupied by them starting from Arcot to Kanniyakumari," he said.

Another collection on display at the exhibition belonged to R.S. Saravanan. His thematic collection was all about the currencies issued on Queen Elizabeth II. On display were 100 currencies printed in 30 countries that were British colonies. "This included a 20 dollar currency of Canada which carries the photograph of the Queen, when she was eight years old," he said.

A group of eight students of Class VII – V. Vignesh, M. Danush, Nivin Raj, K. Harish Kumar, S.S. Bhuvaneswaran, S. Prabanjan, Sanjay Christopher S and Harees H – had displayed their collection of Indian and foreign coins and currencies and stamps at the exhibition. "Three years ago, we came to this exhibition, and developed an interest in collecting coins and stamps," said Harish Kumar. His friend Bhuvaneswaran added that this hobby helped him to learn about the currencies of various countries. Mohamed Ashraf Ali, an archaeological explorer, displayed precious and semi precious stones found in Vellore.



## **Numismatic Collectibles Brings the Past Alive**

erala: A numismatic exhibition conducted at Sri C. Achutha Menon Government College, Thrissur, threw light on bygone era.

The main attraction of the two-day exhibition, organized as part of Sastrayan 2018 by the Department of History of the college, was coins and currency issued by various dynasties from 600 BC - 2000 AD. Coins and currencies from the personal collection of Leeju C.J were displayed in this exhibition. The collection included coins issued by 196 dynasties, independent kingdoms, sultanates and princely States. They were displayed under the categories of ancient period, medieval period, early modern period, modern period and colonial period. 236 countries Coins issued by 236 countries were on display. British India coins issued under King



William IV, Queen Victoria, King Edward VII, King George V, and King George VI were much appreciated by visitors. The collection also included coins from 65 European colonies. Around 300 different bi-metallic coins, 70 hole coins, 50 Crown size coins, 40 error coins and 8,500 stainless steel 10 paisa coins were also among the collection.

Currency notes from 145 countries, including those issued during the first and second world wars, were also on display.

## Commemorative Coins of Modern India: Year wise & mint wise journey with ICCG News

ommemorative coins of India are usually issued to celebrate some special occasion or to mark a special event. They also have been issued as a mark of respect towards some distinguished individuals or monument. Indian commemorative coins were issued from the 1964 onwards. Such coins have a distinct design with reference to the occasion on which they were issued. Few coins of this category serve as collector's items only, although most commemorative coins are issued for regular circulation. Modern and Commemorative Indian Coins are very interesting to discuss as they cover various topics like Indian Independence Struggle, War, Peace, Wildlife, Vegetation, Great Personalities, Various Events and Organizations. The highest valued coin is INR 1000 that was issued on the occasion of 1000 years of Brihadeeswarar Temple. In 1 set, there may be 2 to 9 coins of different denominations.

MINTS: Commemorative coins are made at various mints across India including the ones at (Bombay) Mumbai, Noida, (Calcutta) Kolkata & Hyderabad. 1990 – Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Centenary Commemoration

Dr. B.R.Ambedkar (Bhim Rao Ramji Ambedkar) also known as Babasaheb Ambedkar was the architect of India's constitution. He was born on 14th April, 1891 in an untouchable family and he led an extensive fight against the practice and prejudices of untouchability. He is also credited with having sparked the Dalit Buddhist movement. He breathed his last on 6th December, 1956. Ambedkar has been honored with the Bharat Ratna, India's highest civilian award.

Obverse: The obverse of this coin shows the Ashokan lion and the value '1' in International numerals on the center. In English "INDIA" and "RUPEE" appear on the right periphery and in Hindi "Bharat" and "Rupaya" appear on the left. "Satyameva Jayate' in Hindi is shown just below the Ashokan Lion.

Reverse: The reverse of this coin shows his effigy. The legend 'DR. B. R. AMBEDKAR CENTENARY' in English is inscribed along right half of the periphery and in Hindi along the left half of the periphery. '1990' – the year of the beginning of centenary celebration appear below his effigy.

## **Delhi National Museum in Search of a Numismatist**

elhi: The National Museum in the Capital suffers from a shortage of staff at all junior and senior levels and of these, the most important vacancy has existed since the last two years when the only 'Numismatist' (currency collector and expert, especially coins), retired from the post. With digitization of coins currently going on, the work of the main curator is being handled by an assistant staffer.

In a recently answered question in the Lok Sabha on the shortage of staff, Mahesh Sharma, Minister for Culture, revealed that almost all the departments and museums under the ministry are facing a staff shortage. The National Museum, for



instance, needs 268 people on its staff and there are only 139, an almost 50 per cent scarcity. Dr R K Tiwari, deputy curator, retired in 2016, and the museum has failed to find someone since then.

"The charges of the curator are currently being handled by the assistant curator. The tenders were filed last year and we are hopeful of getting a numismatist. With all these exhibitions in the pipeline, there is a dire need of the curator here," said a senior CPIO at the museum, on the condition of anonymity.

With over 130,000 coins in its reserve, the museum is currently in the process of digitization. Over 50,000 coins have been digitized in the last two years. The National Museum, in its reserve, has some of the rarest coins, ranging from sixth century BC, when coins are believed to have first appeared in the country.

Looking at the shortage in all of the archaeology departments, the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) has announced to soon start a government recognized post-graduation course to provide training in archaeology, which also includes expertise in Numismatics, Conservation, and Heritage Management. This National Institute of Archaeology will soon be established in Greater Noida to provide higher education in the subject.

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








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
