
How did you start with your collection?

My fascination towards my subject of History and Geography was more than enough to drive me towards Philately and Numismatics quite naturally. That was just a fancy. As I started collecting collectibles, I got to learn a lot and my collection also kept growing. It was in the last few years or so that coins have become a serious passion for me as I started to get more and more passionate towards Historical places, Antiquities, Coins and just everything related to the Mughal era.

What are your areas of interest in coins?

My major interest is the study of the coins of the 'Golden Age' Samudragupta and the coins of the Mughal era. There are few books available on these subjects and I am sure to learn a lot on them. During my recent visit to Jaipur which has always been my dream place, I met Shri. Prakash Kothari who has a vast knowledge in himself on the coins of Jaipur state. I hope to learn a lot from him in coming future as well.

But you collect republic India coins. Isn't it?

Yes, at present I have a collection of Republic India coins both date wise and mint wise with few gaps to be filled. I am also learning die verities. Incidentally my younger sister Ms. Siddhi Upadhyay is also a hobby enthusiastic who collects coins and is also a member of ICCG (smiles Ms. Shikha).

You also collect stamps. How did you start with it?

My interest in stamps started due to my love for 'Moon'. Once while visiting a numismatic and philatelic exhibition in Mumbai I came across some postal stamps with the image of moon and moon is something that really fascinates me as it is the most beautiful, noticeable feature in the night sky and it is also the brightest. Today I don't have a huge collection of stamps but I do have a decent thematic collection which helps me in keeping my interest alive.

Have you ever shared your collection with anyone?

Yes, I do display my collectibles to my friends, colleagues, relatives and close ones. At the first sight people don't see it worth but after learning the importance of the collection and the hobby they view it with more respect. For me, this is also a small way of spreading awareness about this hobby and get more involved in it.

Did you face any challenges while collecting items for your collection?

One of the biggest challenge every serious collector faces, including myself, is that

prices of collectibles are often hiked amongst dealers. And further as there is neither any benchmark nor a clear market indicator, collectors come across many collectible coins with huge price tags and finally he/she has to shell out much more than its original cost. Also when that same item is put up for sale, the dealers give such a discouraging price that the collector feels let down and most of the time ends up making a loss.

With all your collections, how much satisfaction do you feel within?

I believe the collection always keeps growing and every step forward increases a certain amount of passion within you to explore more and more. Hobby is for Happiness, it is something of your choice, something unique you like to do. I feel hobby is necessary for relaxation of the mind. So, one can never be satisfied as such passions are never ending.

How do you think, we could encourage more kids & young collectors to get involved with this hobby?

I surely feel more kids should be encouraged towards this interesting hobby. We must take them to various numismatic exhibitions, which would help them in getting more knowledge and meet other collectors people associated with this hobby.

Do you feel this to be a costly hobby?

Yes, it is a costly hobby, but it is worth it. One gains not just the priceless collectibles, but also immense knowledge about different countries, their history and geography.

Any message for young collectors:

Whether stamps or coins, one should learn to organize his/her collection. Many times we see some collectors just dumping coins or stamps in some drawers or boxes. That's wrong way to continue. One should organize the collection and always try to exhibit it in the right manner.

West Africa bloc adopts 'ECO' as name of planned shared currency

Analysts express scepticism the introduction of the ECOWAS single currency will solve the region's economic problems

buja, Nigeria - Leaders of a 15nation West African bloc have called for greater structural reforms as they step up efforts for the introduction of a shared currency, aimed to be launched in 2020.

In a statement issued late on Saturday at the end of an Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) summit in Nigeria's capital, Abuja, the leaders said they had adopted ECO as the name of the planned currency.

The bloc, which represents an estimated population of about 385 million people, said it acknowledged a 2018 report which underlined



"the worsening of the macroeconomic convergence" and urged member states to do "more to improve on their performance" as the deadline for the establishment of a monetary union approached.

The 2018 report called, among others, for the promotion and liberalisation of regional trade, the consolidation of the customs union and the creation of a free trade area - all of which are yet to be met.

Mahamadou Issoufou, ECOWAS chairman and Niger's president, said there was "a real firm political will" to increase efforts ahead of the January 2020 deadline.

"We are of the view that countries that are ready will launch the single currency and countries that are not ready will join the programme as they comply with all six convergence criteria," Issoufou said.

Analysts sceptical

Leaders in the bloc have for decades held discussions and meetings on issuing a common currency amid efforts to boost regional trade and investment, without, however, making significant progress.

Currently, eight ECOWAS countries - Benin, Burkina Faso, Guinea-Bissau, Ivory Coast, Mali, Niger, Senegal and Togo - use the CFA Franc, while the other seven - Cape Verde, The Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Liberia, Nigeria and Sierra Leone - have their own currencies.


Adewunmi Emoruwa, a policy analyst with Gatefield, a public strategy and media group, said he was not convinced that the introduction of a single currency would solve the region's economic problems.

"The common currency on its own will not necessarily make doing business any easier than it is now. If policymakers see the single currency as the magic wand for boosting intraregional trade, they will be disappointed," Emoruwa told Al Jazeera.

"The ECOWAS bloc is particularly volatile, both politically and economically. It means countries might need to create unique responses to shocks which would be limited by the common monetary policy control.

Moreover, it's uncertain that regional economies are strong enough to back bailouts in the event of a crisis among participating member states," he said.

According to the African Development Bank, regional inflation has stood at double digits since 2015, way above the five percent target outlined as one of the convergence criteria for ECO's implementation. Meanwhile, Nigeria, which controls two-thirds of the regional economy, has struggled to meet its growth projections

ntroduction- It would be interesting to suggest that the animal /birds motifs on the coins were used as symbols of religious belief, In this regard the representation of the ''peacock ''is known earliest on seals and later on coins.

During this journey the peacock first appeared on Ashoken and post Ashoken punch marks coins, Gupta & post Gupta coins but later it is depicted nowhere, not on Mughal Coinage, even if we come to the period of princely states, it appeared only on copper "takka" of Jaipur state on the issues of Alamgir II, and for a very short period of his RY 4 to the starting of his RY 5 only, except this we do not found the depiction of peacock on the coinage of any state on any metal issues, we found bird on Jaisalmer state rupee not peacock. It is a new chapter, which I am trying to open here, however these issues bearing a peacock were used on coins for a very short period, are very difficult to come across.

Details of coin-

In this article some unrecorded types of Jaipur state copper coins has been presented. I have noticed some different types of peacock depicted on these Jaipur state copper coins. These copper coins were struck during the reign of maharaja Sawai Ishwari Singh (1743- 1760) but the peacock appears only during the reign of Mughal emperor Alamgir II, in the RY 4 & RY 5 only.

All these coins, which bear a peacock, are in the name of Alamgir II.

Metal-copper Weight-18.4-18.9 gram Diameter-20-22 mm

Mint-Sawai Jaipur RY-4 & 5 Denomination-Takka (paisa)

Obverse - Gazi Badshah Alamgir

Reverse - Zerb Sawai Jaipur Sanah..4 / 5 ... and a peacock

The peacock appears different in shape, posture & at different position at bottom, as on the coins of RY-4, it appears at bottom left. While on the issues of RY-5 it appears at right side, both depictions includes minor, but notable varieties of postures of the peacock, this appearance of the peacock seems to be during the last part of the RY-4 and in the beginning of the RY-5, for a short span, it definitely associated with some hitherto unknown or event behind this depiction.

Importance of peacock in royal family Jaipur could well be seen since long specially here---

(A) **Peacock Gate**- city palace is the most famous place in pink city. One of the gates is known as 'peacock gate'. The peacock gate is one of the most famous among all, this gate is beautifully

designed & painted.

- (B) **Chandra Mahal** City Palace Jaipur includes the Chandra Mahal. Chandra Mahal is said to be the peacock crown of Jaipur city.
- (c) **Gaitore** Gaitore is a royal cremation ground for the Kachhwaha Rajput Kings & the members of royal family. We can see here peacock carving & designs on beautiful white marble structure, there are many other examples, which provide a close association of this beautiful bird with royal family for a long span of time.

Of course there would have been a definitive reason behind the depiction of this special symbol of peacock, just for two RY dates, however it is very difficult to ascertain this, a good and obvious clue / suggestion that I got was—" these marks may symbolize the " mint daroga or mint contractor's mark, other possible suggestion may also be there and would be welcomed and solicited in due course, to reach up to some overall acceptable conclusion.

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


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US Postal Service Celebrates Apollo 11 Moon Landing with 'Forever' Stamps

he U.S. Postal Service (USPS) will issue some very special stamps to celebrate the first moon landing 50 years ago. On July 19, 2019 - the day before that historic anniversary - USPS will issue two new "forever stamps" to honor the Apollo 11 landing, which saw astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin descend safely to the surface. Forever stamps are a USPS concept created in 2007. The service calls them "non-denominational" postage for first-class service, meaning that if the first-class postal rate increases after the customer purchases the stamps, the buyer can still use the same stamps.

Each of the two new stamp designs shows an image representing the Apollo 11

landing. The first is based on Armstrong's iconic photograph of Aldrin - and his own reflection - during one of their moon walks. The other shows a photograph of the moon, with the Apollo 11 landing site marked with a yellow dot. Both stamps were designed by Antonio Alcalá, the art director for USPS.

To mark the release, the stamps will be free on July 19 for any visitors to the Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex's Apollo/Saturn V Center (which requires a short bus ride from the main complex hub) at 11 a.m. EDT. USPS also plans to broadcast live on NASA Television from the Kennedy Space Center and other "remote locations" later in the day.

When Apollo 11 launched, USPS had arranged for a stamped envelope to fly with the astronauts, so that they could postmark it on the moon. But Aldrin and Armstrong forgot to do so until after they headed back home, according to a 2013 Space.com article.

USPS finally got its "moon mail" during Apollo 15 in August 1971, when commander David Scott postmarked an envelope during his third and last excursion on the lunar rover. USPS, from a distance of 238,000 miles (383,000 kilometers) away from Scott, issued the same stamps on Earth. This "moon mail" was different from another set of stamps the Apollo 15 crew postmarked without NASA's knowledge. When a dealer began to sell the envelopes, the agency changed its rules about what astronauts could take with them during spaceflights, according to collect SPACE.

Renovated Philately Bureau Inaugurated at Head Post Office

angaluru, Jun 20: "Local MP and MLAs need to take up the initiative to bring out a postage stamp in the name of politician late U Srinivas Mallya," said chief post master General Dr Charles Lobo.

He was speaking after inaugurating the renovated philately bureau here at the head post office in Pandeshwar on June 20.

Dr Charles Lobo also said, "Renowned politician U S Mallya had strived hard for the overall development of Mangaluru, but unfortunately there is no postage stamp featuring him. We have released a special cover on U S Mallya. Local MP, MLAs and the



government should take up initiative to bring out postage stamp depicting politician US Mallya.

"We are also conducting state level KARNAPEX 2019, a philatelic exhibition from October 12 to 15. During the occasion, we are going to release a postage stamp on late George Fernandes to pay tribute to him. This is the first time, a state level exhibition is going to be held in the city. Earlier, it was successfully held in Bengaluru, Mysuru and Dharwad," said Dr Charles Lobo.

He further said, "Today is an historic day as we have inaugurated the renovated philatelic bureau. This bureau is well executed. There are only 66 such bureaus in India and four in Karnataka, out of which, Mangaluru is one."

Post master general of south Karnataka zone, S Rajendra Kumar said, "This is a historic day for us. Mangaluru is a place where there are lots of philatelists and this will definitely encourage them. Even they can exhibit their collections in this bureau. There is a particular space earmarked for them."

Senior post master Mangaluru zone, Sriharsha said, "Even though the writing of letters is fading away slowly, the importance of stamp has not diminished. It has its own value. Stamp is a medium which is more effective to recognize culture and heritage of the country. I want this philately bureau to be one of the tourist places, especially for students, during their school excursions, as they can visit in large numbers to know about this philately bureau."

Meanwhile, the logo of state level philately exhibition 'KARNAPEX 2019' was released. The logo is designed by eminent environmentalist Dinesh Holla.

Later, addressing the press meet, chief post master general Dr Charles Lobo said, "Mangaluru has good philately club. Philatelic bureau was set up in Mangaluru head post office in the year 1989. Customers can get the philatelic materials at their door steps by opening philatelic deposit accounts. Currently, 1066 PD accounts are available at Mangaluru philatelic bureau. Stamp is also known to be a cultural ambassador and very good revenue earning source."

"State level philatelic exhibition is going to be held in the month of October. Anyone can take part in the exhibition, but the condition is that the participant should be a resident of Karnataka state," said Dr Charles Lobo.

He also said, "We are also planning to open additional 4.5 lakh accounts for students' scholarship from the state government. We already have three lakh accounts with us for students' scholarship. Except loans, all facilities are given in the post office."


